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### **Caring For Our Caregivers**

Dear HSL Families and friends of the Bilingual Russian program. We appealed to you in the middle of the COVID-19 pandemic to show your appreciation to HSL staff and asked you not to take their work for granted as they cared for your loved ones through severe staffing shortages, at the great risk to their own health. HCL emerged from this experience stronger than ever, with a deepening commitment to protect our patients and support their families. However, as the pandemic is winding down and the federal and state governments are preparing to lift the Public Health Emergency in May, staffing shortages remain extremely challenging. In fact, Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) data indicates that nationally, nursing homes have lost more than 200,000 workers over the course of the pandemic and the nursing home workforce is at levels not seen since 1994. Although nursing homes added an average of 3,700 jobs per month over the last 9 months, at the current pace, nursing homes would not return to pre-pandemic levels until 2027. While all health care sectors are impacted by these staffing shortages, the impact on Long-Term Care is the most severe.

Here at HSL, we strive to provide the best work environment for our staff, offer competitive salaries and generous benefits, including career growth opportunities and tuition reimbursement. Although these conditions are generally much better than in other similar places, this work is very hard and we continue to experience staff shortages to this day. We rely on the funds generously donated by our supporters to cover the staffing gaps, provide additional services to our patients, hold appreciation events, and pay bonuses to our staff. In June of 2023, the Friends of the Bilingual Russian program will be initiating a special Fund Drive to support HSL staff who care for your loved ones. We urge HSL families and friends to come together as a community and support this effort.
